Arumugam has now left the home and is working successfully as a tailor in the local town but comes back to see me when I visit to help out and give the other boys advice if they need it.


Arumugam means "six faces" in Tamil (Aru = six and Mugam = face) and to my knowledge all his six faces are always smiling broadly!!!

#### NEEM TREE TRUST GO GREEN BAGS



### ST LUKE'S LEPROSY HOSPITAL

The Neem Tree Trust sponsors a bed at St Luke's Leprosy Hospital, Peikulam in south India. The lady who occupied the bed when I visited the hospital last year was a widow named Theresa from the scheduled caste (once called untouchables). She is 46 years old and contracted leprosy as a child. She has four children and her husband died a year ago. Because her condition was not diagnosed correctly for many years the leprosy bacteria has destroyed the sensory nerves in her feet and hands. She is being treated free of charge at St Luke's Hospital where she has had surgery on her feet and will be given a course of multi-drug treatment and after a while her ulcers will be fully cured. As part of her rehabilitation she will be given two goats to rear and she is also being taught how to make colourful woven baskets, which she can sell to generate a small income.





This is a picture of some of the women at St Luke's Hospital who are being treated for leprosy. Leprosy is curable and if caught in time the patient can recover with no lasting effects. However, the young girl third from the left in the picture, whose name is Kannigaa, has a very rare incurable skin disease called Epidermolysis Bullosa Simplex. St Luke's is caring for her free of charge, and the Neem Tree Trust is sponsoring this courageous young girl with the beautiful smile.

Jesu Raj is a former patient at St Luke's who has been cured of leprosy and has worked at the hospital as a physic technician and house warden for many years. He is the smiling face that greets all visitors to the hospital and I am privileged to have met him and honoured to be his friend. He was married last August and I was delighted to meet his new wife, Vinolia, on my last visit to St Luke's.

There are many supporters of St Luke's who live on the Isle of Wight. Margaret & Joe Dawson and their daughter Ruth Barber raise considerable funds for the hospital by organising events such as coffee mornings, fashion shows, choir evenings and sales of goods. They also receive personal donations from individuals who have been moved by stories they have heard from Margaret, Joe and Ruth of the work which is being done to help the patients and the children. As a registered charity, which supports St Luke's, The Neem Tree Trust is able to claim Gift Aid where applicable and I take out the funds they have raised, together with our own donations to Dr Jeyabalan when I visit the hospital each year.
