In August 2011 we sent out our annual newsletter to supporters giving them an update on the children's progress and inviting them to make a donation to The Neem Tree Trust for the benefit of the children at the Boys' Home and the patients and children at the Leprosy Hospital. SCHT BOYS HOME

During the financial year 2011/2012 the Trust provided a grant of £21,002 to the SCHT Boys' Home to pay for:

- Educational trips for the children.
- Assistance with welfare and rehabilitation when the boys return to their villages after leaving the home.
- Installing a safety cover over the large well on the campus.
- Refurbishment of Study Hall with a new roof.
- Replacement batteries for the generator which is used during the frequent power cuts.
- Corrective surgery on the feet of two boys.



Kathy Miller visited the SCHT Boys' Home in January/February 2012. She stayed for three weeks and during that time observed both the improvements at the home and the development of the boys. Kathy had meetings with Dr Karuna Chelliah and his Board of Directors regarding future needs at the home. It is with much sorrow, however, that we have to inform all our supporters that Dr Karuna Chelliah died suddenly of a heart attack on 29th March 2012, just one month after her visit.

In 1976 Dr Chelliah had a serious motorcycle accident and he was not expected to live. Thankfully, he did survive but was left paralysed and confined to a wheelchair. As a way of giving thanks for his remarkable recovery he set up the home for disabled boys in Tirunelveli. Being disabled himself he knew full well the needs and aspirations of the boys and he ran the home with dedication and commitment. His example showed generations of boys that disability is no barrier to leading a full life and making a contribution to society.

The meaning of Karuna is compassion and Dr Karuna Chelliah lived the meaning of his name and was an example to all those living with any kind of disability. He was such a very special man, so kind, courteous and courageous and it was a privilege for Kathy to have met him. He made his vision of the Boys' Home a reality and kept it alive with his heart, body and soul and she felt honoured to be able to support him in his work.

The doctor's goodness was obvious for all to see and he will be sadly missed but his legacy will live on through his wife, Mrs Princess Karuna, who has been appointed Secretary by the Boys' Home Board Members.



We are sure that all the supporters of The Neem Tree Trust will join us in expressing their deepest sympathy on the passing of Dr Chelliah but we would also like to celebrate his life and the thousands of lives he touched and enriched through his goodness and sacrifice.

ST LUKE'S LEPROSY HOSPITAL

Through the Trust, a number of dedicated supporters of St Luke's have made donations towards the feeding programme set up at the hospital for the benefit of the in-patients and children as well as sponsoring individual children. A special mention must be made of Joseph Prince Chandran Dawson "Joe" who lived on the Isle of Wight with his wife Margaret. Joe, originally from Tamil Nadu, died in November 2011 at the age of 84. He was a very popular, fun loving Christian man who, together with his family, had supported St Luke's Leprosy Hospital for many years. At his funeral Joe's family asked for donations to be made to The Neem Tree Trust for the benefit of St Luke's.



During the financial year 2011/2012 the Trust provided a grant of £14,000 to St Luke's Leprosy Hospital. Dr Haebus, Medical Superintendent at St Luke's Leprosy Hospital, has deposited £10,687 into an interest bearing Deposit Account to provide income for future feeding and other patient support. The balance of £3313 will be used in the current year for children's education and general day-to-day care of leprosy patients. A further £1910 was passed to certain beneficiaries specified by donors.

Kathy visited St Luke's Leprosy Hospital in January 2012 and once again met with the patients and children. She toured both the male and female wards and saw for herself the beds which are sponsored by the donors and the ongoing work being carried out to care for the patients.


During Kathy's visit approximately 50 of the children from St Luke's had an outing to the Boys' Home on 30th January 2012. This has become an annual event which we call "Peikulam meets Krishnapuram" because St Luke's Hospital is in the village of Peikulam and the Boys' Home is in the village of Krishnapuram. All the children enjoyed a wonderful day of sport, music, drama and friendship.

The patients who have been cured of leprosy make these colourful woven baskets. St Luke's provide the raw material, training and

marketing which enables them to earn an income and to live with dignity. Kathy arranged for a number of these baskets to be sent to her home in Wiltshire and she sold them to members of the congregation of St Peter's Church, Chippenham after she gave a talk at their Harvest Service in October 2011.



Rajeshwari is 21 years old and some years ago felt numbness in both feet but it was sometime before her family were advised to take her to St Luke's where leprosy was diagnosed. She has now been cured of leprosy but the damage to her feet and sensory loss is irreversible. After minor surgery, the staff at St Luke's have advised her to wear special protective footwear and to apply for a disability certificate. After finishing her studies they plan to send her for job oriented training at The Leprosy Mission Regional Vocational Training Centre, Vadathorasalur. All treatment at St Luke's is free of cost.

In Tamil Nadu bangles are presented to a pregnant woman during her seventh month of pregnancy and the ceremony is known as Valakappu. The sound of these bangles reaches the baby in the womb and is believed to have a good effect on the unborn child. The bangles are removed only after delivery of the baby. On 28th April 2012 Glory gave birth to a beautiful baby girl named Joy.



YOUNG PEOPLE RAISING FUNDS FOR ST LUKE'S

Established in 1919, **Oakley Holidays** is a registered charity organised on a voluntary, not-for-profit basis, and run to provide opportunities for young people primarily aged between 12-18. Holidays for up to 100 people are held at Bilton Grange Preparatory School at Dunchurch near Rugby during school Easter and summer breaks and last for one week. Spare five pence pieces at the daily tuck shop are collected by the young people in a piggy bank named Boaris Johnson and donated to the work of the St Luke's Leprosy Hospital.
