FUNDRAISING ACTIVITIES

Due to Covid restrictions during the financial year 2020/2021 most of our fundraising events were cancelled but John Kendall, Patricia Kinzett and Kathy Miller each held a Christmas shop in their homes which generated £3467.00 and £94.00 came from other miscellaneous sales.

In November 2020 we sent out our annual newsletter for the first time by email to supporters giving them an update on the children's progress and inviting them to make a donation to The Neem Tree Trust for the benefit of the children at the boys' home and the patients and children at the Leprosy Hospital. Donations from individuals and organisations for both the Boys' Home and St Luke's, including regular standing orders, amounted to £25,406.00

The Neem Tree Trust deposits funds as they are raised into a CAF Gold account. In the financial year 2020/2021 bank interest amounted to £15.00.

SCHT BOYS' HOME

During our Financial Year 2020/2021 the Trust provided a grant of £20,000 to the SCHT Boys' Home.

From 1st July the boys who are studying IXth, Xth, XIth and XIIth standard have been staying at the campus and their subjects were taught by the staff and wardens. Last time I visited the boys' home we purchased a projector and screen for use at the home and I am delighted to say that it has been very useful for the classes when their subjects are taught by their teachers online.

The boys were especially encouraged to spend some time in the garden during the pandemic. They were interested and involved in the farming activities and now they have a variety of vegetables from the home garden. During the pandemic some of the families of the boys were suffering due to loss of earnings and the home, with the help of The Neem Tree Trust, assisted those families by offering them rice and groceries to feed their children.



On 22nd August Mr Stephen, one of the wardens who has worked at the home for over 13 years, married Miss Ramya. All the boys and staff went to the wedding and it was a memorable day for all of them. The newly wedded couple will join the home as members of staff.



ST LUKE'S LEPROSARIUM

During our Financial Year 2020/2021 the Trust provided a grant of £10,000 to St Luke's Leprosarium.

I have recently received the following message from Dr Haebus, Medical Superintendent at St Luke's:

"Dear Mrs. Kathy Miller,

Greetings from St. Luke's Leprosarium, Peikulam. We have around 125 inpatients staying in our hospital just now. We are all safe here and our hospital is functioning as usual. We have regular outpatients as well as inpatients coming to our hospital and we are running separate fever clinics and triage. Our work load has increased, both for out-patients and in-patients. We have visiting consultants for Paediatrics, Obstetrics & Gynaecology, Surgery and Orthopaedics. We are not seeing many COVID patients now. All our staff are vaccinated and all our permanent patients are also vaccinated. Things are improving and hopefully we will get back to our normal lives soon. Thank you once again for all your care and concern for our cause"

100% of the hospital's expenses are met by donors and well-wishers and it is humbling that a significant donor is our own charity, The Neem Tree Trust. Leprosy has not been eradicated and I would like to thank all our supporters for helping to rehabilitate the leprosy patients at this hospital in assisting them to become independent and self-reliant.

As well as a grant of £10,000 in 2020/2021 The Neem Tree Trust was recently able to send a further £7,000 to St Luke's to assist in the cost of refurbishing and digitalising their x-ray department which is over 30 years old.

An ongoing project at the hospital is the renovation of the women's ward. The present ward is 56 years old and has an asbestos sheet roof which desperately needs replacing.



JOHN KENDALL AND MICHAEL MANSER


I have made many new friends since establishing The Neem Tree Trust in 2003 and two of the most interesting are John Kendall and Michael Manser who have supported our charity for many years. I first met them both at my friends Sue and Ian Bolden's Open Garden in Bradford-on-Avon where we were serving refreshments in aid of The Neem Tree Trust.

Michael and John showed an immediate interest in our charity as they frequently visit India and they have told us fascinating tales of tribal people in Chhattisgarh in Central India as well as friendships with many people in Central and Northern India.

At that time, I was running a Neem Tree Trust Lottery Club which Michael joined, making a donation each year, but as I recall he never actually won a lottery prize!

John has many interests but has a real fascination for antiques, which he developed at an early age when, as a small boy, he would frequently accompany his mother to antique shops. His interest grew when, at 12 years old, he went with his mother to an antiques shop in Swindon. In that shop he saw a beautiful Animalier Bronze by Jules Moigniez which was on sale for £5.00, well beyond his reach at the time but, one year later he had saved up enough money to go back to the shop to buy it and thankfully it was still there. Even as a young boy he had a keen eye! For many years he and his mother ran a small antiques business together and they would take a stall at the Marlborough Antiques Fair each year, which was held in aid of Oxfam.

John first trained as a veterinary surgeon and practised in Chippenham for 10 years, after which he trained as a teacher and taught Rural Science and General Studies for 20 years at George Ward School, Melksham, retiring in 2000.

On April 8th 2021, 45 members of Oakley Holidays, of all ages, shapes, sizes and degrees of fitness, dressed up to walk or run a mile and raise funds for three charities. The Neem Tree Trust, Newcastle NHS Trust and Camfed which promotes the education of women in Tanzania, shared the total of £1150 raised.
